



Defining Advocacy






Noun. Wide range of activities conducted to influence decision makers at various levels. Examples:




Research to Policy



Policymaking and Research-based Information

- 1. Policymakers use research to learn more about a topic (conceptual), to support their beliefs and proposals (symbolic), and to make decisions (instrumental)
- 2. Translation of research to concrete action is facilitated by trusting partnerships and relationships
- 3. Use of research is facilitated by tailoring the research conclusions to the policymakers' immediate need






Who are the Key Policy Actors?





System Administrators and Leaders



Examples:

- State Health Care Authority Secretary, Director, Manager, Supervisor, Program Lead
- Superior Court Judge, Court Administrator
- Regional Health Services Director or Manager
- County Human Services Director or Manager


Avenues to policy:

- Contracts with service providers (performance standards)
- Can be very effective to demonstrate best practice models with local jurisdictions before taking models to scale or pursuing legislation





Advocates and Nonprofits



Examples:

- Consumer groups
- Professional associations (e.g., American Medical Association)


Avenues to policy:

- Internal resolutions making organizational policy and/or creating fiscal note for organized advocacy efforts on the issue
- Amicus briefs in legal cases
- Direct contacts with legislators and lobbying efforts

What experience do they have with the topic?


Why should they care about this?

<u>Step 1</u>: What is your media agenda: Do you want topics covered that are not currently a focus? Do you want the public to know more about an issue? Do you want policymakers to take notice, be held accountable?


<u>Step 2</u>: Cultivate media relationships: Reach out to reporters that cover your "beat." Offer to connect them to people to interview, who have compelling stories. Write an op-ed.

Step 3: Think about whether you are launching a media campaign or a one time story.





Coalition Building




- Built upon common agenda
- Alliance for combined action
- Formal or informal
- Short or long-term
- Focus may be specific policy or programmatic/ideologic
- Harness existing resources
- Broader base = stronger advocacy






Successful Example

Example: Mental Health Diversion Project





Approach




- Interviews with Defense Attorneys, Judges, Prosecutors.
- Information Synthesis
- Facilitated a policy design process with stakeholders (advocates, court reps, attorneys, external experts)

End Result


Worked with state legislators to inform a bill that expanded the ability of prosecutors to divert youth from 1 up to 3 times (later changed to indefinite)

Low use of a legal option to avoid the use of secure placement for youth accused of serious crimes.






