
## **RESPONSE & RECOVERY CONSIDERATIONS**

## POPULATION EXPOSURE MODEL

a) loss or serious injury of friends/family SUPPORT IN Those closest to the "epicenter" of the disaster in terms of immediate and severe impact, are most likely to be affected socially. **DISTRESS OUT** 

- b) exposed to the incident and disaster scene, but not injured
- c) knows person(s) who are bereaved, live in area where homes are destroyed, first responders, medical examiner's staff, professional immediately involved
- d) behavioral health and crime victim assistance, clergy and chaplains, hospital personnel, govt officials, media
- e) groups that identify with the victim/survivor, businesses with financial impact, community at large, distant communities exposed via media
