State Mental Health System

DBHDID is:

- Comprised of three branches: Clinical Services,
 Community Support, and Supports for Community
 Living Waiver
- Working to build resilience and facilitate recovery for people whose lives have been affected by mental illness, intellectual/developmental disabilities, or substance abuse
