About the Presenters

Michael T. Compton, MD, MPH is Professor of Clinical Psychiatry at the Columbia University College of Physicians & Surgeons. Dr. Compton has conducted research on first-episode schizophrenia, the CIT model of collaboration between law enforcement and mental health, a linkage system between police officers and the local mental health system, and the effectiveness of a new form of recovery-oriented community navigation for persons with serious mental illnesses and repeated hospitalizations.

Amy C. Watson, PhD is a professor at Jane Addams College of Social Work at University of Illinois at Chicago. Dr. Watson works on issues involving the relationship between the criminal justice system and mental health systems across the country. For the past two decades, her research has focused on police encounters with persons with mental illnesses and the Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) model. Watson has published on this work and presented findings to local, national and international audiences.
