

Skill Training


Many people living with chronic mental illness lack critical skills Skill deficits interfere with successful community integration

Skill deficits create barriers to achievement of rehabilitation goals Skill deficits may result in ongoing dependency on staff



Skills/Services for Tenancy



Housing Aspect of PSH

Tenants have a lease in their name - have full rights of tenancy under landlord-tenant law.

Leases lack provisions that would not be found in leases held by someone who does not have a psychiatric disability.

Housing in not time-limited, and the lease is renewable at tenants' and owners' option.

Housing is integrated. Tenants have the opportunity to interact with neighbors who do not have psychiatric disabilities.

Housing is affordable - tenants pay no more than 30% of income toward rent and utilities.
