


Mental Health Technology Transfer Center Network Funded by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration



Mountain Plains Mental Health Technology Transfer Center (MHTTC)

The Mountain Plains MHTTC was funded in August 2018 by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration and is a partnership between the University of North Dakota and the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education. This center serves Colorado, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah, and Wyoming. The primary focus is to provide free training, resources, and technical assistance to individuals working with and serving people with mental health disorders.




Year One Snapshot: August 15, 2018 – August 14, 2019

In the first year, the Mountain Plains MHTTC team pulled together experts from around the nation to develop resources, provide trainings, create and share continuing education opportunities, and offer technical assistance to mental health providers throughout the six-state region. To ensure distribution and reach, the team developed a website, created social media pages, and grew an electronic mailing list. Year One Events

The Mountain Plains MHTTC team offered dozens of trainings, spoke at several state, regional, and national meetings, and offered specific technical assistance to populations throughout the six-state region. 
