

First Episode Psychosis and Clinical High Risk National Stakeholders and Key Resources January 2020

The following is a brief list of national stakeholders and key resources related to first episode psychosis and/or clinical high risk.*

PEPPNET (Psychosis-Risk and Early Psychosis Program Network)

- National steering committee of clinicians, educators, policy leaders, government agencies and researchers who are leading community implementation efforts for early psychosis and psychosis risk programs. Through meetings, subgroups, a national listserve and website, PEPPNET supports the development and dissemination of evidence-based best practices and evaluation standards.

EPINET (Early Psychosis Intervention Network)

- In 2019, the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) awarded six research grants (5 regional hubs, 1 coordinating center) for studies to develop a learning health care system for the treatment of early psychosis. The awards are part of a research initiative called Early Psychosis Intervention Network (EPINET), which aims to develop models for the effective delivery of coordinated specialty care (CSC) for early psychosis. Each regional hub will have one or more studies focused on reducing delays in accessing care, improving cognitive functioning, preventing suicide, increasing treatment adherence, and sustaining clinical gains. Each program will use standard clinical measures and uniform data collection. The EPINET National Data Coordinating Center will enable large-scale, practice-based research using data shared by the regional hubs. Susan Azrin is the project officer.

- Early Intervention in Psychosis virtual resource center provides reliable information for practitioners, policymakers, individuals, families, and communities to foster more widespread adoption and utilization of early intervention programming for persons at risk for (or experiencing a first episode of) psychosis. The site includes information from a national RWJF-funded demonstration to identify and prevent the onset of psychotic illness the Early Detection and Intervention for the Prevention of Psychosis Program (EDIPPP) as well as other early intervention initiatives.
