




Trafficking Victims Protection Act (TVPA)


TVPA and its reauthorizations (2003, 2005, 2008 & 2012) define a human trafficking victim as someone w ho is induced to perform labor or a commercial sex act through force, fraud, or coercion.













Society: Sex Trafficking & Prostitution • Silver, Karakurt & Boysen (2015) studied predictors of prosocial behavior toward sex trafficked persons: • 223 undergraduate students provided with vignettes, follow up questions, measure of empathy, just world belief, attitudes towards prostitution, and proactive behavior.






SEX BUYERS IN THE UNITED STATES: DEMAND

- Sex purchasing among adult men was approximately 4% (or 4 million men)
- Rate of sex buying may reach 10 million transactions a year
- Studies show that this group can exhibit high levels of aggression and violence towards trafficking victims














Trafficking is Typically not the First Trauma

• Studies estimate that as many as 70% of women involved in prostitution are trafficked into the commercial sex trade in early adolescence (11-14 years of age) or early childhood.































Promising Interventions Trauma-informed treatments --that stabilize symptoms and build coping; Relationally-bocused approaches --that build trust Relationally-bocused approaches --that build trust Multidisciplinary approaches (peer, health, mental health, legal, social services) --that address multiple presenting concerns; Interventions that work within an ecological and human rights frame --that attend to the whole person and recognize the multiple socio-cultural-contextual issues that contribute to thuman trafficking.

Conclusions & Recommendations

- Human trafficking is NOT an isolated issue but rather a complex and layered issue;
- Develop greater understanding about the consequences of psychological coercion through research and use the knowledge to develop specialized services;
- Increased awareness about the negative impact that stigma towards people who are in commercial sex has in the fight against human trafficking;
- Campaigns to increase empathic concern towards all people who participate in commercial sex;
- Efforts to address the structural and contextual issues that contribute to human trafficking.



A Psychosocial-Historical Definition of Human Trafficking

HISTORICA

Human trafficking is rooted in some of the same social issues that, for over two centuries, fueled the institution of slavery in the American continent.

PSYCHOLOGICAL COERCION

Today, human traffickers' use sophisticated and often hard-to-detect forms of physical and/or psychological coercion to exploit another.

SOCIAL

Human trafficking can also be hard to detect when it hides in the legal and illegal sex industries and other forms of labor where workers are vulnerable to isolating societal stigma that facilitates exploitation.
