<u>Autism Acceptance Month</u> | <u>World Autism</u> <u>Awareness Day (Apr. 2)</u> April


This month we #CelebrateDifferences and neurodiversity by committing to support, understand, accept, include, and empower autistic people.

# 2024 NWPBIS Conference Keynote Speaker

Dr. Grafenreed is a Licensed Psychologist (LP) and a Licensed Specialist in School Psychology (LSSP). Despite her educational attainments and accolades, Dr. Grafenreed considers herself first an educator, having spent nearly 30 years in education as a School Psychologist. Dr. Grafenreed has served Houston area school districts for 24 years, as a School Psychologist, and later as an Education Specialist at Region 4 Education Service Center in the Department of Special Education Solutions.

While at Region 4, the largest Education Service Center in Texas, Dr. Grafenreed led the Texas Behavior Support (TBS) Network, a Texas Education Agency with the goal of building capacity in Texas schools for Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS).

During her tenure at Region 4, she helped develop the Texas Equity Summit, an annual conference designed to address key issues related to school discipline, equity, school climate, and PBIS as the lead for the TBS Network.

Dr. Grafenreed also created the Region 4 Equity Collaborative, which was designed for leaders of districts and charter schools that had been identified as "Significantly Disproportionate" in discipline. The Equity Collaborative introduced district and charter school leaders to educational equity and equity literacy as a tool to address and eliminate disproportionality in school discipline.

Dr. Grafenreed currently serves as a Training and Technical Assistance Coordinator at the University of Washington's School Mental Health Assessment, Research, and Training (SMART) Center and the NWMHTTC.


