### **ABOUT US**

The Northwest Mental Health Technology Transfer Center (Northwest MHTTC) provides training and technical assistance (TA) in evidence-based practices (EBPs) to behavioral health and primary care providers, school and social service staff.

We support professionals who work to improve behavioral health outcomes for individuals with or at risk of developing serious mental illness in SAMHSA's Region 10, the states of Alaska, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington. We are proudly housed within the <u>SPIRIT</u> (Supporting



Psychosis Innovation through Research, Implementation, & Training) Lab at the University of Washington's Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences in Seattle, Washington.

Our center supports the behavioral health and allied workforce to implement specific evidence-based practices for psychosis, including Assertive Community Treatment (ACT); Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Psychosis (CBTp); Coordinated Specialty Care for Early Psychosis (CSC); and evidence-based lifestyle programs.

# Supporting Intensive Training & Technical Assistance: ACT Idaho Startup

Northwest MHTTC core faculty member **Dr. Maria Monroe-DeVita** brings international expertise in implementation and services research related to evidence-based practices for adults with serious mental illness to our center, particularly the Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) model and rural ACT. Several MHTTC ACT resources exist thanks to her work:

- Aided in developing an <u>Intro to ACT e-course</u>
- Held regular <u>National ACT Consultation</u> <u>Meetings</u>
- And produced an <u>ACT Best & Promising</u> <u>Practices Fact Sheet</u> among many other activities.

This foundation and depth of knowledge enabled us to forge a new partnership with Idaho's Division of Behavioral Health.

She provided technical assistance and consultation, working with their new Center of Excellence aiming to launch 7 new ACT teams. Using the e-course and strategic planning, **she then led an in-person ACT train-the-trainer session in Idaho including 12 team members who will lead ACT training and consultation** for the Idaho Division of Behavioral Health Center of Excellence in the future.

This partnership will implement, promote, and expand the use of effective, evidence-based ACT.

### Alaska Workshops: Effective Practices to Support Mental Health In Schools



In spring 2023, the School Mental Health Team sent six professionals with expertise in school mental health, crisis behavioral health response, and trauma-focused care on a weeklong visit to provide training and technical assistance across Alaska.



The team provided one-day workshops in Sitka, Anchorage, and Nome for school and district teams in collaboration with the Alaska Autism Resource Center and the Alaska Special Education Services Agency (SESA). The team enjoyed the return to Alaska for in-person trainings for the first time since the pandemic.

### **New Product Release**

The School Mental Health Team, in partnership with the UW SMART Center and Midwest PBIS Network, released a new collection of resources to support youth in schools and at home. Designed for use by caregivers and educators, this collection will help students process feelings and stress associated with racial trauma.

### Brief Intervention for School Clinicians (BRISC) Hybrid Training

In December 2022, the NWMHTTC SMH Team hosted its first hybrid BRISC Intensive Training for the Battle Ground Public Schools counseling staff in Washington State. A second school district, Salem-Keizer School District in Oregon, was trained in January 2023.

This effort included the launch of an elearning course to maximize availability of training and professional development on BRISC and its core concepts.
